Conservation Update

Alison Wain is teaching a unit on Sustainable Repair and Restoration in the Museum Studies Course at the University of Canberra. Last year she approached us to see if the museum would be willing to lend objects for the University of Canberra to treat. The relationship has progressed and this week Alison visited the museum to select items for her students. Alison was very impressed by the diversity of the collection and also by our well organised storage. Fred Monk and Ellie McFadven helped Alison to find items that would be suitable. The items were selected to demonstrate damage where part of the object had become detached. The items that were chosen included a book, a pamphlet, a teapot with a broken lid, a cake of pumice soap, damaged babies bonnets and booties, a piece of horse's harness and a broken chair from the kitchen. Alison hopes that the objects might stimulate interest in Queanbeyan Museum and perhaps encourage students to develop stronger ties with Queanbeyan Museum, perhaps even volunteering. Ellie McFadven


The Wash House

Regional Museums

In 2012 Ellie McFadven and Kerrie Ruth were privileged to take part as reviewers in the Museum and Galleries NSW Standards Program conducted in the Eastern Riverina, Ellie and Kerrie visited Tumut Museum, Kerrie visited Greens Gunyah Museum at Lockhart with Tamara Lavencic and Ellie visited Adelong Alive Museum with Louise Douglas. It was a great experience. The Greens Gunyah folk at Lockhart were inspirational in having survived not one but two floods through their Museum in the last two years! They have had a new Museum designed which would be above the flood level and are busy applying for grants to have their dream realised. It was interesting to discuss the significant items chosen by the groups. Lockhart has a significant collection from *Bronking Station*, which was a huge squatter's holding reflecting the early European settlement of the area including the rise of Australian trade unionism amongst the shearers. Tumut has a highly significant collection focussing on Miles Franklin.

Queanbeyan Museum wins for Collection Management at the 2012 IMAGinE Awards!



On Friday night 23 November, museums, galleries and Indigenous keeping places throughout NSW came together to White Rabbit, Sydney where the winners of the coveted IMAGinE awards were announced.

Queanbeyan Museum won an award for Collection Management for the work carried out by the volunteers of the Queanbeyan and District Historical Museum Society in partnership with Queanbeyan City Council over the last four years; including the implementation of the recommendations of a Preservation Assessment Survey, an ongoing cataloguing and re-housing project, significance assessment training and collection handling for volunteers, and successful completion of stage one and two of a new purpose built storage building. This is a significant achievement for a primarily volunteer run organisation, such as Queanbeyan Museum, who are privileged to be able to work in partnership with Queanbeyan City Council on these Collection Management and other Museum Projects.

Established in 2008, the IMAGinE Awards celebrate the achievements and diversity of a museum and gallery industry comprising of over 650 organisations and approximately 5000 paid and volunteer workers. With over 70 nominations, this year's winners represent the best of regional and metropolitan NSW visual arts and cultural heritage experiences.

Michael Rolfe, Museums & Galleries NSW CEO, said the nominations in the Collection Management Category highlighted the diverse sector's commitment to preserving local histories.

"The judges commented that the nominations to this category reflected how organisations are looking at new strategies and fresh approaches to the management and care of their collections," said Michael Rolfe.

"The winners represented extraordinary achievements made throughout the year with some strong examples of how innovative strategies are helping to create more accessible and meaningful collections."

Cataloguing of reference collection held by QDHMS

The collection of reference material, which includes books and journals, held by the QDHMS is currently being catalogued following standard Library practice and procedures. It is intended that the data for each book and journal title will be loaded onto Mosaic, thus creating a 'Library catalogue' and enabling easier access to this collection. The details of each book will include the author, title, publishing details and a unique call number (or shelf number) together with a synopsis of the book. Journals will include the title and publishing details as well as the holdings, and, if applicable, the holdings policy. Subject headings will be included to facilitate searching for material on a particular subject. The books will be shelved in numerical order by the unique call numbers, and the journals will be maintained in alphabetical order in pamphlet boxes. The arrangement will be the same as that found in most Libraries. Once the collection has been catalogued and loaded onto Mosaic, there will be an ongoing need to catalogue new material as it is received into the reference collection.

Society Excursion – Marilyn's Ruins Tour to Gungahlin (Old Ginninderra)





First Stop The little Black Mountain stone Presbyterian Church was dedicated and opened in 1873. An extension using the same stone was opened in 1901. It was not used as a church after 1920 and fell into disrepair for a period of some 20 years until it was restored and rededicted as St Ninian's in 1942. In 1979 it was again extended, using the same stone, to become the present Uniting Church, Lyneham ACT.

Second stop

Crinigans' Stone Hut Ruin. This was the home of Marilyn's forebears and we heard the heroic tale of the saving of the site and its excavation. We handled numerous small artefacts that had been found in the excavation, which gave great meaning to the visit.

Fourth stop *Charnwood site*. In 1833 Henry Hall became the first resident landowner of the Ginninderra District. He called his grant of 3,492 acres *Charnwood*. Today the exotic trees, including old olive trees, are all that is left to mark the site







Fifth stop *Palmerville Heritage Park, Giralang.* This is an old significant Canberra site. James Ainslie is said to have camped on the Ginninderra Creek when he was seeking pasture for Robert Campbell's sheep in the 1820s. Ainslie was led to better pastures at Pialligo (later *Duntroon*) by an Aboriginal woman. The Ginninderra cricket ground was on the flat land adjacent to the settlement. The Ginninderra team which included famous Aboriginal players had an almost unbeaten record. Under William Davis there were many social occasions at old Ginninderra. A brass band was often in attendance at cricket matches.



Last stop *Weetangera Cemetery* with 23 marked graves, the earliest from 1873 with most from the 1880s.
